9:10 – 10:30 a.m.	Loss of Lowland Conifer Bird Species and Managing Forests for Birds (Alexis Grinde, Marcella Windmuller-Campione)

Forests across the Midwest, including the five major forest types of Minnesota, are facing unprecedented threats from a rapidly changing climate and increasing pest pressures. Simultaneously, regional bird populations are in steep decline, a trend linked to widespread habitat loss and degradation. This talk explores the critical intersection of these two issues, focusing on the highly climate-threatened lowland conifer systems of Minnesota, Wisconsin, and Michigan.

We present findings from recent studies that reveal the limitations of traditional management practices for these sensitive forest types, particularly concerning regeneration, survival, and growth under current stressors. These findings have significant implications for specialized bird communities, such as those of the Boreal Chickadee and Connecticut Warbler, which rely on these specific habitats. To maintain these vital ecosystems and support bird populations, we propose that a new, adaptive approach to management is necessary.

We will discuss preliminary results from experimental cuts designed to build adaptive resilience. The evidence suggests that current management paradigms, developed in the absence of today's environmental stressors, are no longer sufficient. The core takeaway is that a new approach is needed to create resilient and sustainable lowland conifer systems. By using birds and biodiversity as key indicators, we can inform and refine forest management practices, ultimately helping us to tweak the management of other forest systems to ensure their long-term health and the survival of the species that depend on them.
